#### **BIOGRAPHIC SKETCH**

Muriel Farrell was born in 1907 and raised in Ridgefield, New Jersey; she graduated from Ridgefield Grammar School in 1921 and Cliffside Park High School in 1925. Farrell obtained a Bachelor of Arts from Hunter College in June 1930, with a major in Early Childhood Education. Farrell furthered her education by receiving a Master of Arts in 1936 from Teachers College, Columbia University and a Ph. D in 1950 from New York University, School of Education. The title of her dissertation was: Understanding of Time Relations by Five, Six, and Seven Year Old Children of High IQ.

Farrell was initially hired as a substitute instructor in the Department of Education at the former Bronx Campus of Hunter College (now Lehman College) in January 1931. She became an Assistant Professor in 1960, and subsequently became an Associate Professor in 1965. She was an authority on teacher-training and taught at Hunter College for 43 years.

Farrell was a member of the Alumnae Association, School of Education of New York University, Roosevelt House League of Hunter College, Alumnae Association of Hunter College, Kindergarten Alumnae Association of Hunter College, Pi Lambda Theta, the American Association of University Professors, New York Metropolitan Association for Childhood Education, New York State Association for Nursery Education, National Association for Remedial Teachers, and The Bazaar Committee of the Hunter Alumnae which raised funds for Lenox Hill Neighborhood House.

Muriel Farrell retired from Hunter College 1967 - 1968, and died April 6, 1974. She was survived by two stepchildren Margaret and Thomas Ward.

#### SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The Muriel Farrell Papers document, through school notebooks and research papers, undergraduate and graduate courses that Farrell took at Hunter College, Teachers College, Columbia University, and New York University's School of Education from 1926 to 1946. Farrell's school notebooks encompass a variety of subjects including English, history, law, Physiology, Logic, Kindergarten, Education, and Psychology; they are informative and well organized and some of the school notebooks even contain whimsical comments and amateurish pencil sketches.

This collection also highlights Farrell's professional association with Hunter College from 1937-1959. Farrell taught for 43 years and was actively involved with the Alumnae Association of Hunter College, the Bureau of Educational and Vocational Guidance, and the Roosevelt House League. The papers further document Farrell's interest and involvement with many external organizations like the New York State Teachers Association, Student Personnel Association of the Municipal Colleges of the City of New York and the Metropolitan Association for the Study of the Gifted.

The Muriel Farrell Papers consist of undergraduate and graduate school notebooks, class notes and written assignments, article notes and manuscripts, reports, programs, correspondence, newspaper articles, miscellaneous materials and publications. This collection should be of interest to Hunter alumni and researchers who yearn to learn more about a committed educator and an innovator in Kindergarten instruction.

#### SERIES DESCRIPTION

#### Series I – Personal and Biographical Information

The documents in Series I provide a glimpse into Farrell's private and professional life. Farrell's vitaes from 1940, 1951, and 1953 delineate her educational and professional accomplishments. Farrell's correspondence is arranged chronologically.

Farrell's Physics laboratory notebook from Cliffside Park High School comprises Series 2.1. Series 2.2 consists of Farrell's school notebooks during her undergraduate years at Hunter College. The notebooks are related to courses she took in the areas of Education, English, history, law and Political Science, Physics, Physiology, Psychology and Logic. One of the notebooks is actually a scrapbook with various newspaper clippings. Farrell also kept calendar books which detailed school assignments and comments. Series 2.3 and 2.4 consist of notebooks and materials pertaining to her association with Teachers College, Columbia University and New York University's School of Education.

#### Series III – Hunter College

Series III highlights Farrell's professional association with Hunter College from 1937 to 1959. Key folders underscore Farrell's involvement with the Alumnae Association of Hunter College, 1949-1953, the Bureau of Education and Vocational Guidance, 1946, 1952, and her writings during the decade of the 1950's. The folders are arranged alphabetically.

#### Series IV - External Organizations

The Board of Higher Education, 1935 - 1936 and the Metropolitan Association for the Study of the Gifted, 1952, 1957 are featured in this series. Farrell was an active member of the latter organization. The folders are arranged alphabetically.

#### Series V - Publications

Samples of publications that Farrell read and gathered throughout her professional career comprise this series. Significant titles in this series include *The Alumnae News*, 1946 - 1957, *Teacher Education News and Notes*, 1950 - 1958, *T.E.P. Topics*, 1957-1959, and *Views of the New York World's Fair*, 1939. The publications are arranged alphabetically by title.
