

## HISTORICAL NOTE

The Women's City Club of New York was founded in July of 1915 by 100 suffragists who anxiously awaited the passage of the Suffrage Bill by legislators of New York State. The Suffrage Bill was defeated in session, but it didn't dissuade founding members from opening the WCC in rooms that were rented in the Vanderbilt Hotel. New York State legislators finally passed the Suffrage Bill in 1917 and Women's City Club membership began to grow shortly thereafter. It is estimated that in the early 1920's, membership hovered around 3,000.

The founding members of the Women's City Club of New York were initially interested in encouraging women to assume "an intelligent part in municipal government" and on improving the quality of life in New York City. The club's original concern revolved around the welfare of women and children. However, it soon became obvious to members that they needed to broaden their vision and address issues that directly affected all New Yorkers. Over the course of time the WCC expanded its operations and became involved in issues related to education, health, transportation, civil rights, labor conditions, city finances, race relations, status of women, and environmental protection.

The modus operandi of the Women's City Club of New York revolved around committee work. The club had an array of committees and subcommittees which monitored economic, political and social trends, city, state and national government policies, public health, housing, public transportation, women's issues, and educational developments. Typically a committee would investigate an issue and suggest an appropriate course of action. When the issue was deemed crucial or controversial the board would call for a meeting to seek a general consensus of the membership body. It would then authorize the publication of a report in order to bring the committee's findings to the attention of the general public and to officials in City Hall, Albany, and Washington, D.C. The WCC successfully campaigned for reforms in city affairs, housing, the judicial system, quality of life, women's issues, and education, to name a few.

The Records of the Women's City Club of New York stand as a testament to the vision, courage and perseverance of women who struggled to enhance the quality of life for all New Yorkers in the 20<sup>th</sup> Century. The collection is filled with an array of documents that illuminate the accomplishments of an organization that endorsed social and political reforms on the local, state, and national arenas.

For a more in depth look at the history of the Women's City Club of New York, researchers are encouraged to read "Women's Political Choices After Suffrage: The Women's City Club of New York, 1915-1990" by Elisabeth I. Perry in the October 1990 issue of *New York History*.

## SCOPE AND CONTENT NOTE

The historical records of the Women's City Club of New York were originally donated to the Barnard Center for Research on Women at Barnard College on October 29, 1987. Barnard College received the bulk of the historical records, while the WCC held on to the minutes of the Board of Directors, club bulletins, and scrapbooks. The Memoranda of Agreement and the Deed of Gift specified that Barnard College would organize, preserve and assist the WCC in getting their historical records microfilmed.

In 1988, the Women's City Club of New York invited Mr. Randolph H. Boehm, of University Publications of America, to survey their organizational records and submit a proposal for microfilming them. After completing the survey Mr. Boehm recommended microfilming the following records: 1) Annual, Monthly, and Special Meetings, 1916 - 1980; 2) Board of Director's Meetings, 1916 - 1980; 3) Minutes of the Standing Committees, 1916 - 1980; 4) Calendars, 1923 -1972; 5) Publications, 1917 - 1980; 6) Anniversary Materials, 1951 - 1975; 7) Legal Documents; 8) Miscellaneous Materials; and 9) Scrapbooks. Boehm's proposal was accepted and in 1989 U.P.A. published a microfilm guide to the WCC records titled *Grassroots Women's Organizations: Records of the Women's City Club of New York, 1916-1980.* This became the first guide to provide a port of entry into the historical records of the Women's City Club.

As a result of a dispute between the Women's City Club of New York and Barnard College the organizational records of the WCC were removed from Barnard College in 1989 and were deposited with Hunter College of the City University of New York on March 6, 1991. In a ceremony that was held in the Faculty Dining Room of Hunter College, Mrs. June L. Farmer, president of the WCC, joyfully remarked that "We are entrusting our archives to Hunter College with the knowledge that they will be accessible to scholars, students, and those who want to know how, why, when, and who made the Women's City Club an effective organization." President Paul LeClerc of Hunter College acknowledged the receipt of the WCC archives and remarked on "the importance to academia of archival material and how it brings to life the significant contributions made by women and men of the past."

Professor Julio L. Hernandez-Delgado, Head of Archives & Special Collections of the Hunter College Libraries, undertook the task of organizing the paper records of the Women's City Club of New York in 1993. Professor Hernandez-Delgado adopted the nine series that were created by U.P.A., but also generated additional series that incorporated the presidents' files, committee reports, photographs, fund raising files, newspaper articles and clippings, press releases, chronology files, and the Edith S. Isaacs Papers.

In 2001, 2005 and 2013, the Women's City Club of New York deposited supplementary records to Archives & Special Collections of the Hunter College Libraries. The supplementary records were added to the main collection as Addenda I, II and III and were organized in accordance with the previously established series. However, it should be noted that Series IV - Ad Hoc and Standing Committees, Series VI - Activities and Events and Series XI - Publications were modified to include subseries.

The Records of the Women's City Club of New York, 1915 - 2011, consists of annual reports, minutes of the Board of Directors, president office files, minutes and files of ad hoc and standing committees, motions, calendars, programs, summaries of open meetings, audiotapes, videotapes, photographs and negatives, legal documents, serials, reports, studies, surveys, press releases, scrapbooks, newspaper articles and clippings, memorabilia, position papers, and the Edith S. Isaacs Papers. In addition, the collection contains papers, reports and publications from a variety of external organizations.

According to Professor Elisabeth Israels Perry, the study of organizations like the Women's City Club "should not be ignored, as such associations provide a large amount of concrete and incontrovertible detail about women's political ideas and actions." Researchers will find the Records of the Women's City Club of New York an invaluable source for the study of arts and cultural affairs, campaign financing, court, electoral and legislative reform, education, government operations, health, housing and planning, transportation, youth, urban tensions, and the status of women in New York City.

# SERIES DESCRIPTION

#### Series I – Annual, Monthly and Special Meetings, 1916 - 1983

The minutes provide a broad view of the club's activities, staff, finances, and goals through 1983. The minutes usually include standing committee summary reports and reports of the presidents. The minutes are arranged chronologically.

#### Series II - Board of Directors' Meetings, 1916 - 1985

The monthly minutes of the Board of Directors provide detailed accounts of programs and activities. The minutes chronicle discussions and decisions rendered by the Board of Directors on major social, economic, and political issues. Reports presented by civic and standing committees, as well as financial statements are usually included. The minutes are arranged chronologically.

#### Series III - Presidents' Files, 1916 - 1986

Series III includes announcements, brochures, correspondence, memoranda, reports, statements, and studies that are associated with former presidents Mrs. Alice Duer Miller, Mrs. Mary Garrett Hay, Mrs. H. Edward Dreier, Mrs. Emory J. Barnes, Mrs. Nathan Straus, Dr. Ethel E. Wortis, Juliet M. Bartlett, Mrs. Jeremiah C. Ingersoll, Mrs. Roy R. Neuberger, Edythe W. First, Ernestine Friedlaender, and Mrs. Laurence Farmer. The bulk of the files pertain to presidents Farmer and Friedlaender. The files are arranged by surname and by when each individual assumed the presidency of the Women's City Club of New York, Inc. Some of the presidential files may contain materials that may predate and/or postdate their respective terms of office.

#### Series IV - Ad Hoc and Standing Committees, 1916 - 1992

Subseries 4.1 Minutes Subseries 4.2 Committee Files

The edition of the Records of the Women's City Club of New York originally indexed the minutes of select standing committees. Subseries 4.1 was revised to include the minutes of all the ad hoc and standing committees. This subseries has been expanded to include the minutes of the Election Committee, the Government Operations Committee, the Committee on Housing, the Nominating Committee, the Projects Committee, the Committee on Public Needs-Public Money, the Status of Women Committee, the Tapes Review Committee, and the Committee on Urban Tensions. The minutes are arranged alphabetically by committee name, then chronological within. Subseries 4.2 consists of correspondence, press releases, reports, and statements of each committee. The files enhance the committee minutes by providing supplementary information on their activities. The files are arranged alphabetically by committee name.

#### Series V - Calendars, 1923 - 1984

The calendars are published programs of the WCC's monthly meetings. Researchers can access calendars prior to 1923 by utilizing the microfilm edition of the collection. The calendars are arranged chronologically.

#### Series VI – Activities and Events, 1916 - 1989

Subseries 6.1 consists of programs and materials from a variety of WCC activities and events and they are arranged chronologically. Subseries 6.2 consists of summaries of open meetings that are arranged alphabetically by guest speakers. Subseries 6.3 consists of more than 200 audiotape recordings. Some of the audiotapes contain actual recordings of open meetings while the remaining tapes record an array of programs. The tapes are arranged by tape number as received from the Women's City Club and will remain unavailable to researchers until they are transferred to another readable format.

#### Series VII – Photographs, 1915 - 1993

Visual representation of WCC affairs and support staff are captured in this series. Subseries 7.1 consists of black & white prints of activities. The photographs are arranged alphabetically by the name of the activity. Subseries 7.2 consists of black & white prints of members and notables of the social and political realm of New York City. The photographs are arranged alphabetically by surname. Subseries 7.3 consists of black & white photographs of identified and unidentified WCC staff. Subseries 7.4 consists of contact sheets, color slides, lantern slides and negatives of activities like the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary (1955) and the Golden Anniversary Luncheon (1965). There are also several visuals of unidentified events.

#### Series VIII - Anniversary Materials, 1926 - 1990

This series consists of programs, correspondence, financial reports, invitations, newspaper clippings, press releases, rosters, publications, and seating plans for the 10<sup>th</sup>, 20<sup>th</sup>, 25<sup>th</sup>, 32<sup>nd</sup>, 35<sup>th</sup>, 36<sup>th</sup>, 40<sup>th</sup>, 50<sup>th</sup>, 60<sup>th</sup> and 75<sup>th</sup> anniversaries. Some of the programs contain photographs and recollections of early club leaders as well as brief histories of the club. The bulk of the materials pertain to the 50<sup>th</sup> and 60<sup>th</sup> anniversaries. The folders are arranged chronologically by anniversary.

#### Series IX – Legal Documents, 1915 - 1981

This series includes copies of the constitution and by-laws as well as the Certificate of Incorporation of the Women's City Club of New York. In addition, there are certificates of copyright registration, leases and subleases, mortgages, property assessments for the original quarters and insurance documents. The folders are arranged alphabetically by type of document.

#### Series X – Fund Raising, 1916 - 1999

This series consists of correspondence, memoranda, and proposals related to fund raising drives like the Christmas Appeal and the Civic Fund. The folders are arranged alphabetically by the name of the fund and/or foundation.

#### Series XI – Publications, 1916 - 1992

Subseries 11.1 Serials Subseries 11.2 Reports, Studies, and Surveys

Subseries 11.1 consists of serials which cover a wide spectrum of political, social, and economic issues. The *Bulletin*, first published in March 1917, was renamed the *Quarterly Bulletin* in March 1919. The *Quarterly Bulletin* was renamed *Women's City Club Bulletin* in November 1921, which finally became *The Quarterly* in March 1927. The Women's City Club didn't produce a serial during the economic depression of the 1930's, but did resume with the publication *Off the Agenda* in 1943. Subsequent title changes that emerged included the *WCC Agenda* in 1957 and *On the Agenda* in 1958. The serials are arranged chronologically. Subseries 11.2 contains reports, studies, and surveys which focus on issues related to housing, fiscal planning, better schools, juvenile delinquency, literacy, New York City zoning, local school boards, women in executive positions, and New York City courts, to name a few. The reports and studies are arranged alphabetically by topic.

#### Series XII - Press Releases, 1953 - 1983

This series consists of press releases that highlight WCC statements, scheduled activities, events and programs. The press releases are arranged chronologically.

#### Series XIII – Edith S. Isaacs Papers, 1949 - 1962

Edith S. Isaacs was a writer of poetry and drama and was an active member of the War Committee, Program Committee, and Membership Committee of the Women's City Club. The papers include correspondence, committee reports, verses, drama scripts, and a handsome album titled "A Garland of Verses: Selected from the Writings of Edith S. Isaacs."

#### Series XIV – Scrapbooks, 1930 - 1971

The scrapbooks contain samples of WCC stationary, club calendars, election ballots, newspaper articles and clippings, constitution and by-laws, membership applications and rosters, programs, committee reports, copies of *Off the Agenda*, and miscellaneous materials. Membership applications are confidential and will remain closed to researchers indefinitely. Scrapbooks for the years 1916 - 1918, 1920 - 1921, and 1924 - 1932 are only available on reel 20 of the microfilm edition of the Women's City Club of New York collection.

#### Series XV - Newspaper Articles and Clippings, 1916 - 1994

This series consists of articles and clippings from various newspapers covering a miscellany of activities, events, and general topics. The bulk of the newspaper clippings span from the 1950's through 1980's. There are no newspaper clippings for the 1920's and 1940's. The newspaper clippings are arranged chronologically.

#### Series XVI – Chronology Files, 1971 - 1979

This series consists of copies of letters, memoranda, and releases distributed by the WCC to individuals, city officials, and foundations. The folders are arranged chronologically.

#### Series XVII - Miscellaneous Materials

The series consists of WCC documents and forms associated with the Maternity Center in New York City, brochures and flyers, legislative programs, statements, and ephemera. Summary of programs for 1940 were removed and placed in Subseries 6.1 Programs and Materials. The materials are arranged alphabetically by category with the exception of Box 86, a flat box, which contains an assortment of memorabilia.

#### Series XVIII - Organizations, 1918 - 1992

Subseries 18.1 Papers and Reports Subseries 18.2 Serials

Subseries 18.1 consists of the papers and reports from organizations like the Board of Education, Children's Television Workshop, Community Council of Greater New York, Department of City Planning, New York City Department of Health, etc. The papers and reports are arranged alphabetically under the name of the organization. Subseries 18.2 consists of an assortment of serials that were acquired or collected by individuals and/or committee members. The titles of the serials are arranged alphabetically.

#### Addenda I

The Women's City Club of New York deposited supplementary materials in Archives & Special Collections in 2001. The records were arranged in accordance with the series and subseries that were originally established. The records include Board of Directors' Meetings, 1980 - 1997; Presidents' Files, 1971 - 1997; minutes and general files of Ad Hoc and Standing Committees, 1932 - 2001; Calendars, 1973 - 1988; Activities and Events, 1980 - 1995; Photographs, 1918 - 1990; Anniversary Materials, 1965 - 2006; Legal Documents, 1961 - 1999; Fund Raising, 1991; Publications, 1916 - 2005; Press Releases, 1945 - 1997; Newspaper Clippings, 1962 - 1991; Chronology Files, 1977 - 1992; and Miscellaneous Materials.

It should be noted that the publication *WCC Agenda* was renamed *Agenda* in June 1984. Series IV was reorganized to include Subseries 4.1 Committee Minutes, 4.2 Committee Files, 4.3 Subcommittees, 4.4 Coalitions, and 4.5 Task Forces. Subseries 6.4 was added to Series VI to reflect the donation of videotapes.

#### Addenda II

The Women's City Club of New York deposited additional materials in Archives & Special Collections in 2005. The records were arranged in accordance with the series and subseries that were established and/or revised in Addenda I. Records include Monthly and Special Meetings, 1982 - 2000; Board of Directors' Meetings, 1915 - 2000; Presidents' Files, 1980 - 2001; minutes and general files of Ad Hoc and Standing Committees, 1915 - 2008; Activities and Events, 1955 - 2005; Photographs, 1982 - 1983; Anniversary Materials, 1965 - 2001; Legal Documents, 1989 - 2002;

Publications, 1925 - 2000; Scrapbooks, 1955 - 1956; Miscellaneous Materials; and Organizations, 1968 - 1995.

Subseries 11.3 Books, Booklets, Handbooks and Pamphlets was added to Series XI.

#### Addenda III

The Women's City Club of New York deposited 17 cubic feet of supplementary materials in Archives & Special Collections in March of 2013. Included here are materials arranged in accordance with the series and subseries established and/or revised in Addenda I and II.
