4. Databases that we will be looking at:

Academic Search Premier (EBSCO): provides access to scholarly and non-scholarly literature across disciplines back to the mid 1970s; has lots of full text

Education Full Text (Wilson): indexes scholarly and non-scholarly education literature; has some full text.

ERIC (EBSCO): indexes scholarly and professional literature in education as well as ERIC documents; has some full text (Note: ERIC hasn't been updated since late 2003)

Psycinfo (EBSCO): indexes scholarly and professional literature in psychology; has some full text

5. Access from off campus: the proxy server. I recommend that you sign up for the proxy server as soon as possible. This will give you complete access to the online full text that Hunter subscribes to. To sign up online go to <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu/proxy.htm>. Make sure you've gotten a barcode from the circulation desk of the third floor of the library; you'll need it to sign up for the proxy server. (Even without the proxy server, you can get remote access to those databases that feature the green house. Just click on it and enter your library barcode.)

6. Academic Search Premier: Getting in. From <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu/webres.htm> click on

7. Suppose you're looking for scholarly articles on topic 2b above. In the first box type *adolescen* or teen**; in the second box type *sex**; and in the third box type *achiev**. (Note: you can roughly double your results by typing *achiev* or grades* in the third box.)

8. Notice that you can limit your results in different ways. Check **Peer Reviewed Journals** below to limit your search to scholarly articles.

9. Results. Some articles offer HTML full text (generally just the text), PDF full text (the text as it actually appeared in the magazine or journal), or both. Note: if you need to cite the page number(s) of articles, then you generally need PDF. See below to determine whether or not Hunter owns a journal that isn't available in full text through Academic Search Premier.

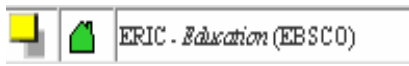

10. Emailing results: Once into the article or its abstract click on E-mail.

11. ERIC in EBSCO: Getting in. From <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu/webres.htm> click on the yellow rectangle to the left of ERIC - *Education* (EBSCO).



12. Using the Thesaurus in ERIC. You consult the thesaurus to determine the vocabulary that the database uses for your topic. (Note: The Thesaurus functions the same way in Psycinfo.)

13. In the **Browse for** box type *teenagers*.



14. If the term that you've chosen isn't a Thesaurus term, ERIC will often refer you to the term that is.

15. You can then use the thesaurus terms that you find for fruitful keyword searches.

16. Combining Academic Search Premier, Eric, and Psycinfo. You can search any of the EBSCO databases jointly. The searching software is nearly the same for all databases.

17. From <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu/webres.htm> choose



24. Tracking down online (electronic) articles. From <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu>, click on **Electronic Journals** on the left side of your screen. Type in the name of the magazine or journal you're seeking. If Hunter owns it electronically, you will find information about holdings and links to the full text.

25. Sample search. Suppose you want to know whether Hunter has electronic access to *The Journal of Personality*, August 2003. Type *journal of personality* in the search box.

26. Finding articles not available electronically. Not everything is available electronically. When you don't find what you need in Electronic Journals, you have to go into CUNY+ and do a title search under the name of the journal. From <http://library.hunter.cuny.edu> (the Hunter Library Homepage) choose **CUNY+**.



27. Enter the journal title, *journal of teacher education*, in the lower box, under **Browse Alphabetical List**.
