The Annual Report.

We hold in our hands the annual report of the Associate Alumnae. It is wonderfully interesting reading, and speaks for itself as to the amount of work done during the year. We commend it to your earnest perusal and study.

“We are becoming better known among the community, and never has there been more widespread interest in Alumnae work, either within the Association or without. We are on a strong basis; old graduates keep coming back, and our circle of workers has materially widened.” We quote from the President’s report.

Our enrolled membership is 1,065. The Treasurer reports disbursements to the amount of \$541.81 from the general fund for incidental and current expenses. The Library Committee has received \$1,596 and disbursed \$701 during the year. The Shakespeare Committee has received \$361 and expended \$347.

The combined receipts of the Kindergarten and Kindergarten Co-operative Committees have been \$1,161. The cash now on hand for this work is \$1,235.

The receipts for the ALUMNÆ NEWS have been \$182. This is not what it should be with a membership of 1,065, every one of whom is presumably interested in the welfare of her Alma Mater and its graduates. But there is no question that as the graduates appreciate the benefits of keeping in touch with the Association (and how better can this be accomplished than through the medium of such a paper as the NEWS?) the subscription list will double and treble itself.

For the Neustadt, Wood and Covell Memorials there have been expended \$448, with a balance in hand of about \$700.

We call attention to these statistics. They show how widespread the work is becoming, and how great is the need of time, money, labor, on the part of each and every one who can afford one or the other, or all. The Treasury needs funds; the Committees need members; the Association needs work and workers.

We wish there were space for a more extended review of the report. It should be read from cover to cover with the thought in mind, “Where can I best help?”
