## RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED AT A MEETING OF THE ASSOCIATE ALUMNAE OF HUNTER COLLEGE OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, NOVEMBER 12, 1921

*Resolved*, That the Associate Alumnae of Hunter College of the City of New York, assembled on the twelfth day of November, 1921, desire to express to the President of the United States their earnest hope for the success of the Conference on Limitation of Armaments, summoned by him to meet on this day.

*Resolved*, That the fullest measure of publicity possible in the circumstances is a fundamental condition of such success.

*Resolved*, That the whole heart of the American people echoes to-day the eloquent words lately spoken by the President: "There must be, there shall be, the commanding voice of a conscious civilization against armed warfare."

## THE THOMAS HUNTER HISTORY PRIZE FUND

(At a meeting of the Finance Committee held on October 4th, the following resolutions were acted upon, and it was decided to recommend them to the Executive Committee at its November 9th meeting. They were unanimously adopted by the latter body.)

The Chicago, Burlington, and Quincy joint 4 bond of \$1000 matured in June, 1921. It was sold and a Northern Pacific 6 was purchased. This bond will mature on July 1, 2047. The yearly income derived from the bond will thus be \$60 instead of \$40 as formerly.

Miss Hester A. Roberts moved that under the original conditions for the \$40 prize, a second prize of \$20 be given for History in memory of Dr. Thomas Hunter.

It was also moved that the Secretary of the Associate Alumnae be requested to send a copy of the resolution to the President of Hunter College, Dr. George Samler Davis.

By the transaction above described \$51.25 was realized.

Miss Hester A. Roberts moved that the \$51.25 be given to the History Department of Hunter College, this amount to be used for the purchase of books or helps in the History Department; such helps to be marked

"In memory of Dr. Thomas Hunter  
Gift of Hunter College Alumnae"

The Head of the Department of History is requested to report to the President of the Hunter College Alumnae how the money has been expended.

It was also moved that the Secretary of the Associate Alumnae be requested to send a copy of this resolution to Dr. George Samler Davis, the President of Hunter College, with a check for the amount of \$51.25.
