COLLEGE NOTES

Dr. Jean F. Brown, the newly appointed principal of Hunter College High School, was honored by the Faculty Club of Hunter College High School at a dinner at the Biltmore, Friday, October 18. Mrs. Brown succeeds Miss Louisa M. Webster, who recently retired from active service.

Dr. Brown received her A.B. degree from Normal College. For a year she taught in the elementary school under Julia Richman, who later became a District Superintendent in the city, and in whose honor Julia Richman High School was named. Subsequently appointed to the staff of Normal College, Dr. Brown taught botany, physics, and mathematics.

From 1907 until her recent appointment as principal, she held the position of First Assistant in Mathematics in Hunter College High School. During this period, New York University conferred upon her the degrees of Master of Arts and Doctor of Phil-

osophy.

Dr. Brown is associated with the National Council of Teachers of Mathematics, the Mathematical Society, the Association of Chairmen of Mathematics of the New York City High Schools, the High School Teachers Association, the Principals Association, the New York City Branch of the National Council of Administrative Women in Education, and the Associate Alumnae of Hunter College.
