COLLEGE NOTES

Hunter students are being grouped according to their neighborhood zones so that they may be found readily when needed for concerted action in an emergency. Hunter is the first college in the country to use this "block" system, which was instituted by the New York Police Department during the last war.

Acting on President Shuster's suggestion, the Student Defense Committee has begun to put Hunter's 7,000 students "on the map". Every student will, within the next two months, have filled out cards containing a diagram of the exact location of her residence in her neighborhood. The information given on the cards is checked off on wall maps of the five boroughs, which have been put up in the defense headquarters on the third floor of the College Building.

Another division of the Student Defense Committee will supply more than 500 soldiers with "postal pals" at Hunter. Five hundred and fifty-six students have volunteered to correspond with men in the armed forces.

A third activity of the committee is the stamp sale, which between December 8th and January 8th netted \$1,500 in defense stamp purchases. The goal of the committee is a stamp-a-week to be sold to every student.
