CONCERTS AT COLLEGE

The Hunter College Concert Committee, of which Dean Eleanor H. Grady is Chairman and President George N. Shuster is Honorary Chairman, is now entering upon its third season under the excellent management of its Executive Director, Mr. Benno M. Lee.

Mr. Lee has behind him a brilliant career -terminated by Hitler's seizure of Austriaof twenty-five years as a leading Viennese impresario, in the course of which he organized festivals and concerts with world-famous artists, specializing in giant outdoor performances of operas and plays which he produced together with such men as Pietro Mascagni and Max Reinhardt, and arranging for the Austrian Government, in cooperation with Chancellors Dolfuss and Schuschnigg, productions in Vienna, Rome, Florence, Budapest, and before the Pope. During his two years at Hunter, he has made available for Hunter students and their friends, at amazingly low prices, the services of many stars: numerous singers of the Metropolitan Opera Association; outstanding instrumentalists, such as Emanuel Feuermann, Rudolf Serkin, Erika Morini, and others; the conductor Erno Rapée; and the composer Erich Wolfgang Korngold.
