DRADDY MEMORIAL LECTURES

R. I hrance

On October 22 at 5:00 p.m. the first address in the series of Louise Draddy Memorial Lectures will be delivered in the Playhouse of Hunter College. The well-known novelist, Pulitzer Prize winning historian, and short story writer, Paul Horgan, will speak on "Spiritual Values in the Making of the Southwest", and it is expected that his address will be an important first contribution to a series of nondenominational lectures on the significance of the religious spirit in the world today.

Mr. Horgan is known for his Figures in a Landscape and The Devil in the Desert, and is the author of Great River: The Rio Grande in North American history, which was acclaimed as a masterpiece of American History and which was awarded the Pulitzer Prize, the Bancroft Prize for History, and the Carr P. Rollins Prize from the Texas Institute of Letters. In addition to his writing career, Mr. Horgan has maintained an active interest in all the creative arts and is also known as a keen observer of essential aspects of the current American scene. For these reasons he seems especially well fitted to speak on the topic he has chosen. Father Laurence J. Mc-Ginley, S.J., President of Fordham, will make a few introductory comments.

The Louise Draddy Memorial Lectures were established this year through the generosity of personal friends of Mrs. Draddy and individuals interested in the significance of the project. They commemorate a woman whose constructive interests and unselfish activities extended far beyond her predominant concern with her Alma Mater, Hunter College, as well as with its students and their welfare. The lectures will be concerned with basic spiritual values as these are considered within the framework of humanistic or scientific inquiry in our times, and are open at no charge to the general public. A reception preceding the first lecture will be held in the North Lounge at 4 p.m.
