## HISTORIC EXHIBIT.

Members of the Associate Alumnae whose daughters have graduated or attended courses at Hunter College are requested to send their names and year of graduation and their daughters' names to Committee on Historic Exhibit, Hunter College.

The Hunter College Historic Exhibit in Room 101 this month shows two early diplomas, 1875, 1880, the annual reports for 1870, 1871, 1874, and the programs of the third, fifth, and tenth Commencement Exercises. The committee is trying to get a complete file of these items and would be glad to receive contributions.

In this temporary exhibit may be seen a copy of the original brief sent to Albany for "the establishment of an institution for females" and a copy of the Act passed by the Senate and Assembly in 1888 which made us "a separate and distinct organization and body corporate, with all the powers and privileges of a college."

Among the most valued of the possessions in the Historic Collection is one of the beautiful old chairs which used to stand on the chapel platform. It was designed and built by George Adams Widmayer. E. F.
