

History of Evening and Extension Sessions, Summer Session

- September 15, 1915 - Committee on Evening and Summer School appointed by President Davis to present recommendations to the Faculty for the possible extension of the work of the College.
- November 17, 1915 - Following resolution presented to the Faculty by the Committee: Resolved, That the Board of Trustees be asked for permission to use the College plant and equipment for Evening and Summer Sessions, provided that there is a sufficient demand for such courses, and that a fee to cover the actual cost of the work be charged.
- January 20, 1916 - Resolution for extension work approved by the Board of Trustees. Legislative bill for such work formulated.
- April 12, 1916 - The Mills' Bill, entitled "An act to amend the Greater New York Charter, in relation to the use by persons, associations, and corporations of the lands and buildings of Hunter College", passed the Legislature and was signed by the Governor.
- May 31, 1916 - Board of Trustees granted request for 1916 Summer Session.
- July 6, 1916 to August 25, 1916 - First Hunter College Summer Session.
- November 15, 1916 - Faculty recommended holding of afternoon and evening classes beginning February 1, 1917.
- February 1, 1917 to May 31, 1917 - First Evening Session.
- 1913 - New York City Charter amended to permit charging of fees and admission of non-matriculated students.  
First New York City appropriation for Hunter College Evening Session (\$5,000).
- February, 1920 - Establishment of Bronx Centers.
- September, 1920 - Establishment of Staten Island Centers.  
Cooperation with New York State Department of Education on Adult Immigrant Education Courses.
- September, 1921 - Courses first offered leading to the degrees of A. M. and of B. S.
- Spring, 1922 - Cooperation with the New York State Department of Education on Continuation School Courses.
- Summer Session, 1923- First New York City appropriation for Hunter College Summer Session (\$12,778.00).
- February, 1925 - Establishment of the Brooklyn Branch.
- February, 1926 - Establishment of the Queens Branch.

- February, 1927 - Establishment of the degree of B. S. in Education.  
 September, 1928 - Establishment of the degree of M. S. in Education.  
 June, 1931 - Brooklyn Branch taken over by Brooklyn College.
