It is planned to have the Hunter Booth one of the most eye-catching and attractive of the entire Exposition. Volunteers to man the booth will be needed during the entire seven days. If you can give even one hour of your time, please write and tell us. All help is welcome. Volunteers are also called upon to make or collect things to sell at the Hunter Booth. Any quantity of attractive articles can be sold to the thousands of people who visit the Exposition. Tickets are now on sale at 50¢ each at Alumnae Headquarters. Twenty-five cents from each ticket sold goes to the Fund. Please give your time, or give some articles, or buy tickets.

*Hunter Banks.* These little money collectors can be procured at Alumnae Headquarters. Call there and get one. It is easy to collect small coins in these banks, and everything will add to the Fund. Banks taken since February 14th, 1950, need not be returned until January, 1951. All banks taken before February 14th, 1950, should be returned to Alumnae Headquarters as promptly as possible. Many banks are still out, although a request has been sent out for their return.

*The Rummage Sale.* A Rummage Sale will be held again this year during November. Please do not throw away, give away, or discard *anything*. Save *everything*—toys, clothes, bric-a-brac, old jewelry, furniture—for the Rummage Sale. All four of our campus buildings at Hunter in the Bronx have now been restored to their pre-War state, and some new facilities have been added. Laboratories have been improved, and an apartment has been set up and furnished for the Home Economics students who will be living on campus.

The College buildings have been entirely redecorated, and new furnishings for the students' social rooms are being planned.

Outdoors the wide area between Gillet and Davis Halls is to be landscaped this spring, in keeping with the fine planting of trees and shrubbery elsewhere on campus.

The principal changes which we have had to make and the restoration projects undertaken followed as a result of the fact, as all the Alumnae will remember, that the WAVES were trained on our campus in the War, and that thereafter the UN Security Council met here.
