## BEING ERECTED

## NEW BRONX CENTER TO BE READY NEXT YEAR

Foundations for the new Hunter College Building to be erected on part of the Jerome Park Reservoir site in the Bronx have already been laid, and work on the structural work is now under way, it was announced yesterday by Dean Lewis D. Hill.

The new building, it is expected, will be ready for occupancy in September, 1930. Plans call for a structure with a frontage of 214 feet and a depth of 55 feet. The building will have two wings 75 by 11, and a rear extension in the center for an auditorium. There will be ten classrooms on the first floor, fifteen on the second, eight on the third, and seven on the fourth floor.

The building will also house laboratories, a sewing room, students' exchange, observatory, and library. The future Hunter College will comprise a group of fourteen buildings on a quadrangle. The campus will be enclosed with a wrought iron fence with massive gates to be given by the various classes of the institution.

FRANCES SANFORD

Entered into rest July 22, 1929.

Those connected in any way with Hunter College or its Model School, were shocked during the summer to le rn of the sudden passing of a beloved associate and friend, Miss Frances Sanford. For three days she suffered after an automobile accident which occurred near Holden, Mass., on July 19. The funeral was held at Westport, Conn., on July 25, when friends from far and near gathered to show their love for one whose name was almost a synonym for love. Among them were former pupils, present and former associates, and one member of her College Class of '78.

Much could be said of Miss Sanford's beautiful character and her kindly disposition. The many loyal friends she possessed all bear witness to these. Her hatred of sham or any form of dishonor was as strong as her love for the true and beautiful. The luncheon and testimonial given her some years ago by her former pupils are most significant when it is remembered that for many years Miss Sanford taught the first grade of the elementary school, and it was therefore the tribute of mature women to the first teacher they ever had. Nothing could efface the memory of her atience and encouraging kindness to them, when, as little folks, their first steps were being directed through the gate of knowledge.

In addition to her professional work as a teacher, Miss Sanford's interests were wide and varied. Her appreciation of literature and the fine arts was such that her advice was often sought in connection with these.

Truly it might have been said of her as of Lowell's ideal woman,

"Great feelings hath she of her own Which lesser souls may never know; God giveth them to her alone, And sweet they are as any tone Wherewith the wind may choose to blow."
