IN MEMORIAM

Dr. Anne Elizabeth Burlingame, retired Associate Professor of History, passed away on Oct. 1. Many of us recall her as an outstanding teacher, scholar, and friend. The gift copies of her two published works in the College Library bear this inscription: "To Hunter College and its many students past and present, whom I have taught and loved". In these books, "The Battle of the Books in Its Historical Setting" and "Condorcet, Torchbearer of the French Revolution", Miss Burlingame demonstrated her own ability to set forth from a great body of historical record the salient facts and illumine them for our day, an ability which she sought to instill in us. A native of upstate New York, she was characterized by her contemporaries there as the most brilliant woman who ever came out of Otsego County. Retaining her keen mind and noble courage, in spite of failing strength, she looked forward to publishing a third work, one on Fontenelle, the great French scholar, and thus further developing the theme of her previous works. Her loss will be deeply regretted.

MARGARET G. PLUMB, '16

Ethel Doty Brown, '87, a practicing physician in this city for fifty years, died on November 8 at the age of eighty. A strong advocate of equal opportunity for women doctors, she obtained her medical degree in 1890 from the Women's Medical College of the New York Infirmary for Women and Children, and served as Trustee of the Infirmary, as President of the Women's Medical Society of New York State, and as Treasurer of the Medical Women's National Association. She was also a member of the Women's University Club and the Mayflower Descendants.

Miss Margaret Mitchell died in late November at the Mound Park Hospital in St. Petersburg, Florida. She was a member of the Class of '96. I was graduated on the same day, though-probably because she was in the Normal Course and I in the Academic-I never knew her until I met her in Florida several years ago, through another '96 graduate, who was with me at her funeral on November 29. The pastor spoke highly of her culture and character.

She was just seventy years old. She was a retired New York City school teacher, and had lived in St. Petersburg since 1935, when she purchased a beautiful bungalow where I had visited her at times. Several of her paintings adorned her walls.

Cousins took her to New York to be buried in Woodlawn.
