IN MEMORIAM

Mary Williams, daughter of Rev. William Daniel Williams and Mary Etta Williams, was born in Sterling, Kansas. While her father was stationed at the Church of the Holy Apostles in New York City, she attended Hunter (Normal) College, graduating from the Class of F4 in June 1900. As her father was appointed Archdeacon of Arkansas, the family moved west the same year, and she attended the University of Iowa, where she received the degrees of A. B. and A. M. Thereafter she taught in secondary and private schools of the west, until she married William Jerome English, a lawyer and an alumnus of the same University. After the death of her father, who was then rector of a church in Southington, Conn., Mr. and Mrs. English came east to be with her mother, who still resides at Armsmere, Hartford, Conn. Mary lived there until her death, on July 3, 1946. She was buried from Christ Church Cathedral in that city.

Though living in many states since her graduation from Hunter, she retained her love and admiration for her first College. Since her return to the east, she attended many class reunions; and only ill health and the sudden death of her husband in 1944 prevented her from attending class functions in the last two

years.

Besides her mother, a brother survives, Captain W. P. Williams, for many years Chaplain in the U. S. Navy.

Mary Williams English was a loyal friend and a fine student, with a warm loving heart, a brilliant intellect, and a wonderful character. All who ever met her loved her.

BERNICE MACLEAN MEMORIAL

A memorial fund is being raised to establish the Bernice Maclean Zoology Prize to be given in the Department of Zoology at Mount

Holyoke College.

Bernice Maclean's professional career was marked with distinction, beginning with her instructorship in the Zoology Department at her alma mater, Mount Holyoke College, from 1927 to 1929. Mount Holyoke awarded her the Mary E. Woolley Fellowship in 1929 for graduate work in the Department of Anatomy, College of Physicians and Surgeons, Columbia University. The following year she received a fellowship from that department, then an instructorship, doing additional work also in the Department of Ophthalmology, Columbia University. In 1933 she was appointed to the Hunter College faculty, and from 1941 to 1944 served as Chairman of the Department of Biological Sciences.

The committee feels that there will be many among Dr. Maclean's colleagues and students at Hunter College who will wish to have a share in keeping alive the name and thought of one who stood for so much in every community in which she worked, and who meant so much to her friends. They are trying to reach all those with whom she had acquaintance.

Any contribution is welcome.

It is planned to make the first award in May, 1947. Contributions should be mailed before November 1, 1946. All checks should be made out to the Bernice Maclean Zoology Prize Fund, or to the Committee Chairman, Dr. Dorothy Richardson, to whom they should be sent. Because of the immediate establishment of the award next year, war bonds cannot be accepted. When the fund is completed, the committee will let each donor know the list of contributors and the nature of the award.
