IN MEMORIAM

Miss Mabel H. Taylor, former Chairman of the Department of Physical Education, passed away on November 11th, 1952, her 79th birthday.

Miss Taylor was born and lived all her life in New York City. She taught in the elementary schools of the city for three years after her graduation in 1893 from Normal College. After passing a competitive written examination she was appointed to the Department of Education at Hunter College to teach physical training courses. When the Department of Physical Education was established, she became Chairman; and she served in that capacity until her retirement in 1936.

She lived in Sunnyside, Long Island City. When she had the opportunity and the health she would go to her "shack" in Long Beach or to her bungalow at Rainbow Lake in the Adirondacks.

Miss Taylor was interested in the athletic activities of the students, and gave financial support to the Athletic Association even during her retirement. The Physical Education Major club gave Miss Taylor's name to their organization when it separated from the Athletic Association in 1940.

We who knew Miss Taylor will miss the lady of tall stature with her pink complexion. Her keen sense of humor and her forthright sense of justice will be long remembered.
