IN MEMORIAM

It is not often that an individual is granted the span of years sufficient to allow for the birthday of a dream and its fulfillment. But to Mary A. Wells this was vouchsafed.

She was born in Vermont ninety years ago and came to New York at the age of twelve and was graduated from Normal College in 1880. She died on July 31, 1951.

Imbued always with the love of children and the passion for education, she became interested in kindergarten work long before it was introduced into the school system. Her dream was to establish a free kindergarten for under-privileged children of the East Side. Through her efforts this was accomplished; and on October 27, 1890, the Alumnae Kindergarten was opened under the auspices of the Free Kindergarten Association, and was housed in the Chapel of the Mission Building belonging to the Church of the Epiphany at 63rd Street and First Avenue.

It was with anguished fears and hopes that she awaited the first applicants. They came! and here under the fostering care of the "Kindergarten Mother", the child garden grew and flourished. Through her successful work with the little ones she was able to reach into the homes, and the circle of her influence grew even wider. Supplementary activities were established; committees took charge of a library, clothing, entertainment, and fresh air work. Possibilities and opportunities kept opening before us, and the Mission Hall was no longer adequate for our needs. In October, 1894, the Associate Alumnae rented a house at 446 East 72nd Street, which was known as Alumnae House of Normal College, with Mary Wells its first resident director. Thus was born what today is Lenox Hill Settlement.

Mary Wells was privileged to watch her work grow from year to year to the fullest fulfilment of her Dream; and on the fiftieth anniversary of the establishment of the Settlement, she was present to witness that growth depicted in beautiful pageantry, and herself acçlaimed and honored for her foresight, her imagination, her courage, and the inspiration of her spirit of service. The Settlement was proud of her and she was proud of the Settlement.

And so the circle closes. We must not mourn her death, but rather rejoice that she has lived.
