Patricia Sposato and Elizabeth Boyle Twiname collaborated on a book about Fort Ticonderoga, commissioned by the Pell family of Ticonderoga and Long Island. Janet Suslak Indick, mother of two children, wrote the music for Ice Cream in the Soup, a children's musical, for which her husband, Benjamin, wrote the lyrics. It won first prize in a contest sponsored by the Playhouse Children's Theatre, and was presented at the Philadelphia Playhouse in the Park. In our own college, we are fortunate in having J. Marilyn Mikulsky as a member of the Art Department. Mrs. Mikulsky, who was chairman of the Art Department of Hendrick Hudson High School, Montrose, New York, and curriculum consultant to the New York State Education Department, has sold paintings at an average price of \$500.00 to private collectors, including Arthur Godfrey.
