At the time of our going to press, with the drive just beginning, several hundred dollars have already been raised. This sum will no doubt be much increased by the several entertainments planned for the Fund. In next month's News we hope to be able to announce the contribution to the Fund of a substantial sum.

Professor Simons sent to the Treasurer of the Student Friendship War Fund checks amounting to \$1,950 collected by students and instructors. If any alumnae would like to help in making the gift \$2,000, contributions would be gratefully received.

The cast for the Varsity play, "Mice and Men", has been chosen after a great deal of keen competition. Undergraduate interest and coöperation promise much for the success of the play, while the high standard of Varsity play performances is too well known to need any comment.

Alumnae coöperation is earnestly solicited. There will be two performances, one on the afternoon of Friday, April 19, and the other on Saturday evening, April 20.
