THE STORY OF "FAME"

In lieu of a report on the Silver Anniversary Class, I'd appreciate an opportunity to give the Associate Alumnae a brief history of "Fame".

"Fame" was our class serious song at the May 1925 Sing. In those days, the music and lyrics of certain Sing songs had to be original or the class suffered a score penalty. Frances Friedman Kurland, our pianist, wrote the music. Pauline Swerling Malamut wrote the words. The song expresses our love and loyalty and devotion to Hunter College. I can still see my classmates, gathered in the gym, listening to "Fame" the first time Frances played it for us. We of '25 are very proud of Frances and Pauline, proud that our song has played a part in the history of Hunter College.
