8:10 - Final health check-up at Health Clinic (3rd floor).

8:20 - Children gather in auditorium where they are divided into groups of ten by camp counselors and volunteers. Final instructions given. All baggage tagged. Collection of spending money.

8:40 - Children board buses for camp.

LENOX HILL CAMP: The Lenox Hill Camp is located on Bantam Lake, near Litchfield, Conn. It is run by the Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association as part of its year-around program for people of all ages, races and creeds. The purpose of the camp is to give children and old people, who would otherwise have to spend the summer in the city, a chance to enjoy three weeks in the country away from their tenement homes and the hot city streets. The camp schedule for children is divided into three, three-week periods. Eighty children (40 boys, 40 girls) go to the camp each period. During the rest of the summer, they attend the Lenox Hill Summer Play School held at the Neighborhood House from July 6th to August 27th. The old people go to the camp during the early part of September.

LENOX HILL NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE
TO OPEN SUMMER PROGRAM JULY 6TH

An eight-week summer program geared to the hot weather needs of all age groups will be conducted by the Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association at the Neighborhood House, 331 East 70th Street, starting July 6th.

The program was announced by Miss Lillian D. Robbins, executive director of the Association, who explained that it is designed to give the public the maximum use of the facilities of the Neighborhood House during the summer months.

Included in the program are a day care center for children of working mothers, a play school for children between six and thirteen, and specially planned and supervised activities for teen-agers and adults. All age groups will be able to use the swimming pool, two gymnasiums, ceramics and woodwork shops, indoor lounges and game rooms, and the two large outdoor terraces which will be used as play areas during the day and for dances and special activities at night.

In addition to the activities at the Neighborhood House, there will be picnics and special trips to points of interest in the city. Teen-agers will be invited to attend several major league baseball games.

In connection with its summer program, the Association also operates a summer camp at Bantam Lake, Conn. The camp schedule for children is divided into three, three-week periods. Eighty children attend the camp each period. Members of the Friendship Club, a social group for people over fifty-five, spend ten days at the camp during September.

The Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association is a non-profit organization. It was founded sixty years ago by the Associate Alumnae of Hunter College to serve the Yorkville area between 59th Street and 96th Street, east of Fifth Avenue. The summer schedule is part of its year-around program for people of all ages, races and creeds.

LENOX HILL NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION
OPENS FUND RAISING DRIVE NOV. FIRST

The Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association on November first will launch a double-barreled campaign for funds to carry on its program in the coming year and to raise a million dollars for a ten-year development fund.

Announcement of the two-pronged campaign was made by James M. Snowden, president of the Association, which is celebrating its sixtieth anniversary this year. Mr. Snowden said that the annual drive to raise the 1954-55 budget of \$310,000 will run from November 1st to 15th. The campaign for the million dollar development fund to expand the agency's services will be launched simultaneously, but will extend over a longer period of time.

"Unless we are successful in raising our operating budget, large-scale reductions will have to be made in our program which currently serves more than a thousand people a day," Mr. Snowden said. "We do not believe that a city which already has an alarming juvenile delinquency rate will allow this to happen. Moreover, we believe the people of this city will want to join in a long-range program to wipe out delinquency."

Lenox Hill Neighborhood House is located at 331 East 70th Street. Its year-'round program for people of all ages, races and creeds is under the direction of Miss Lillian D. Rain Breaks Heat's Grip After 93.9

Heavy rainstorms whipped by gusts of wind as high as 72 miles an hour last night ended a day of record-breaking heat in the metropolitan area. Beginning at 10 P. M., the storm struck in Westchester County, rolled down through the city, and finally passed out to sea.

In a matter of minutes, the mercury dropped 12 degrees, from 90 to 78. At midnight it was 71.

The pattern in the metropolitan area was much the same as that in upstate New York, where the storm hit first. The high winds and rainfall hit hard, lasted for a half hour or less in each area, and left a trail of damage and falling temperatures.

A revised forecast for today predicted a clear day with temperatures ranging from 70 to 86, with fresh northwesterly winds.

The storm, which struck only hours after two Weather Bureau heat records had been broken—the boiling 93.9-degree high made it the hottest day in 1954 and the hottest July 14 on record—caused extensive minor damage.

Windows Shattered.

Trees were felled, damaging autos and houses. Windows were shattered by the wind. There were trifling traffic accidents.

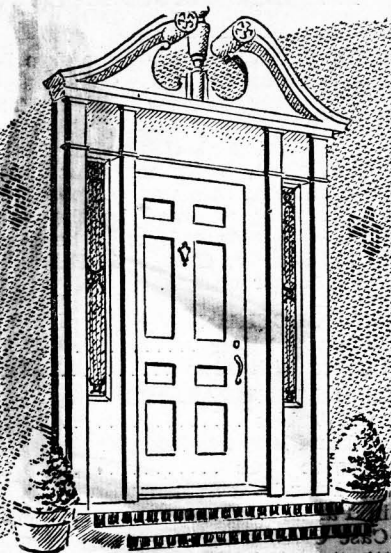
Harbor police reported that a number of small boats were torn from their moorings, and that some craft overturned.

58 Deaths Laid to Heat

Chicago, July 14 (AP).—Heat registering as high as 120 degrees seared about half the nation today. At least 58 deaths were attributed to the heat, by far the worst of the Summer.

The 120-degree reading was at Fort Scott, Kans. In Missouri, Joplin and Sedalia had 115. Missouri recorded 18 deaths blamed on the heat. Other heat deaths were Oklahoma 13, Illinois 7, Kansas 7, Colorado and Kentucky 4 each, Iowa, Louisiana, Nebraska, Pennsylvania and Virginia 1 each.

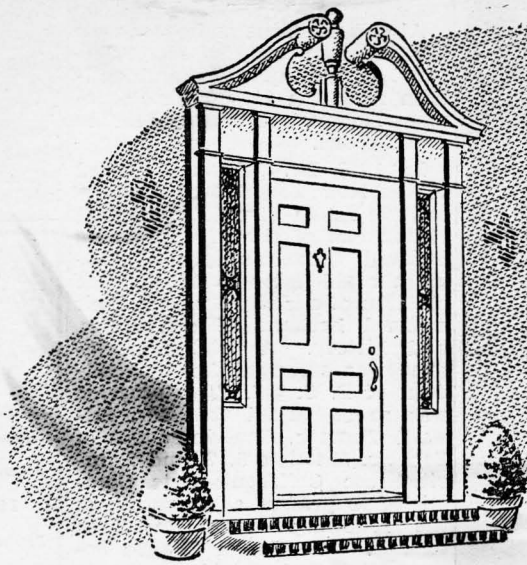

Employment Seen Curb To Delinquency

"Part time employment is more important than supervised play to the average teen-ager," declared Irving Spergel, supervisor of the Neighbors United for Youth project to combat juvenile delinquency in the East Sixties.

"Many of these kids get into trouble simply because they don't have enough to keep them busy," Mr. Spergel told EAST OF FIFTH in an exclusive interview. "In a large number of cases, the parents are out working all day and the children are left to shift for themselves. This independence

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seems to result in anti-social behavior as often as it fosters self-reliance."

The interview followed a recent report made by Mr. Spergel at a meeting of Neighbors United held at the Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association, 331 East 70th St. Mr. Spergel, a 30-year-old social worker who holds degrees from C.C.N.Y. and Columbia Univers-

ity, explained the juvenile delinquency situation in the East Sixties and detailed the progress of the new youth organization.

A survey of the area bordered by Third Avenue, 63rd Street, 69th Street and the East River revealed that although there were comparatively few (2,000) boys and girls between five and 19 years of age in the area, the juvenile crime rate was as high as any other in the city.

Mr. Spergel has concentrated his effort on the 10-15 age group and gained the confidence and interest of many of the confused young people.

"Initial contact has now been made with several teen-age groups," he reported. "We took one group to three big league baseball games and on a beach trip. Another gang was interested in taking a camping trip and arrangements were made for a three-day stay at a New Jersey site."

Mr. Spergel said that he had spent considerable time talking with social workers and directors of welfare agencies in the neighborhood to learn what their experiences had been in working with teen-age gangs and to make arrangements for teen-agers to participate in programs run by other agencies.

In discussing future plans with Neighbors United leaders, the supervisor said he felt the organization needs a headquarters in the neighborhood which could be used as an office and "a place where kids in trouble could come for advice."

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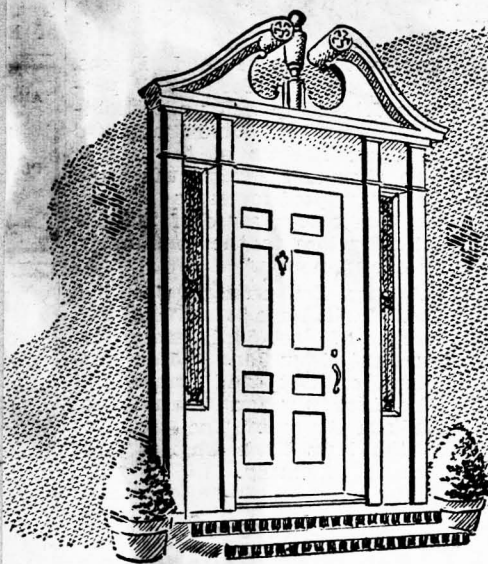

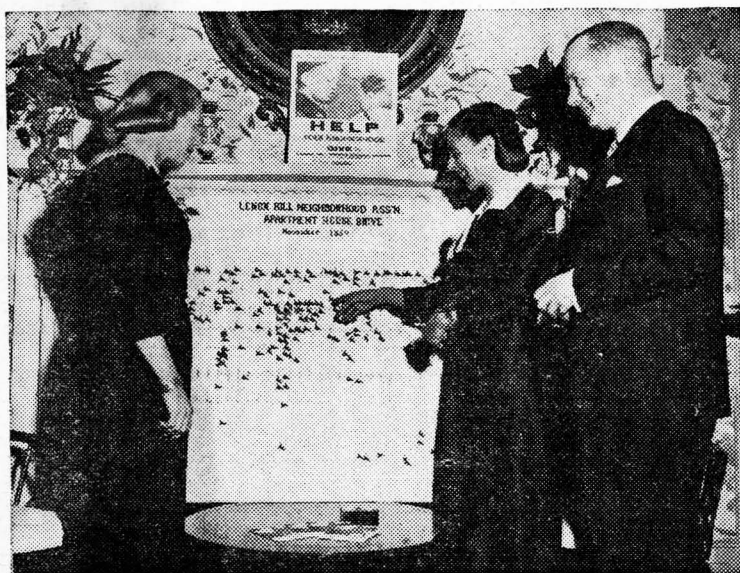

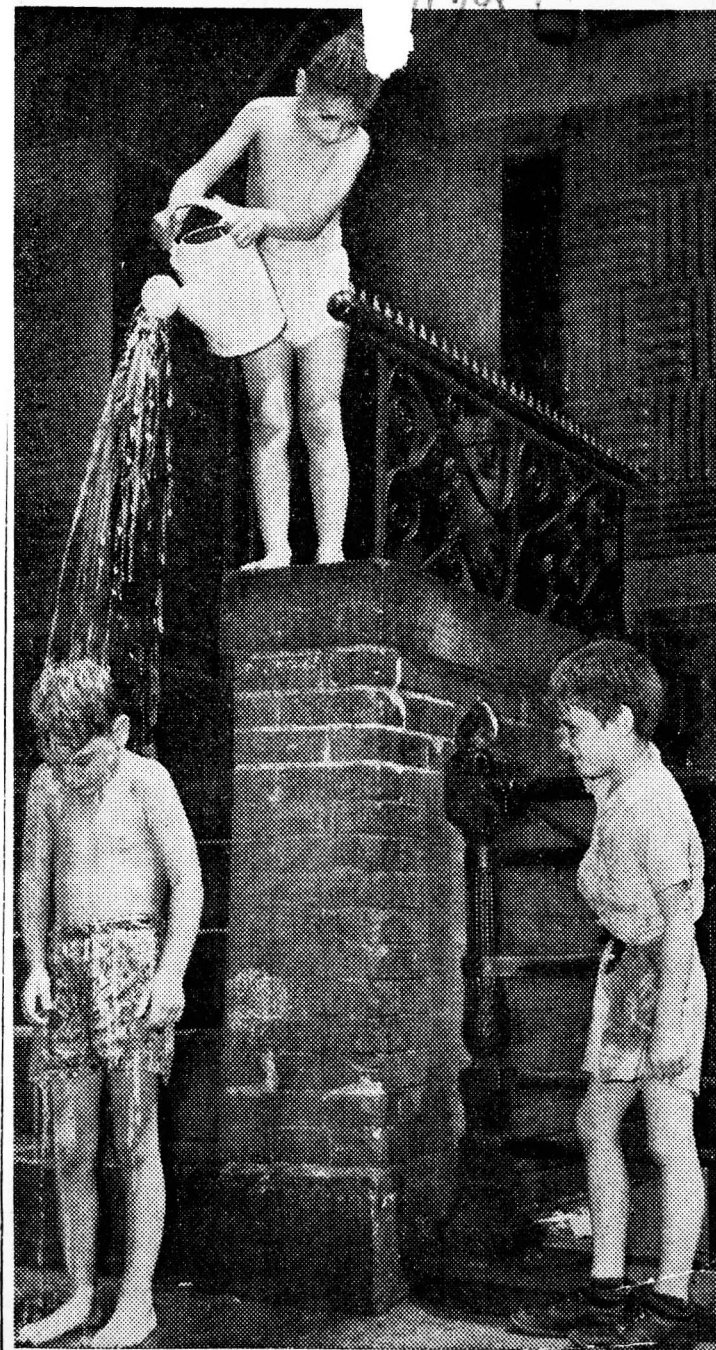

TO GET DIPLOMAS IN HOME NURSING

Along With Girls, Specialists
in Baby Tending, They Win
Child Care Honors

Twenty-one youngsters, eight boys and thirteen girls, proudly received their diplomas yesterday as the first graduates of six-week child care courses given at the Lenox Hill Neighborhood Association, 331 East Seventieth Street. The boys specialized in home nursing, the girls in the care of babies. The courses were given by Mrs. Valeska Grant and Mrs. Jane Patrick, both registered nurses with the association's Lenox Hill Health Service.

"Not a single boy dropped out," Mrs. Patrick said, although admitting that three girls originally enrolled had given up. New groups of boys and girls have already signed up for the next classes, scheduled to begin in two weeks, after hearing reports from those taking the first course, she asserted.

Miss Jule T. Bouchard, resident director of Lenox Hill, presented the diplomas and prizes. She remarked that "If I ever need help with some baby I know, I wouldn't hesitate to send for one of you girls."

Charles Kral, 10, only boy to win a prize, said he thought the course was "swell," adding, "I liked the eats best." The teachers explained that Charles referred to the fruit juices and soups the class learned to make for invalids in the course's nutrition sessions.

Referring to the age range of the girls, 10 to 12, Mrs. Patrick said that "we are not trying to train baby-sitters." However, Annamay Harakson, 14, an experienced baby-sitter, said she had found the course very helpful, especially in such matters as what to do when a baby cries.

"Of course, you learn through experience too," she said wisely. Annamay explained that she "inherited" several baby sitting jobs two years ago from a 15-year-old friend. Now she has "steadies." Annamay said she even had as a customer a family on Park Avenue "which I got through Lenox Hill." She walks the family dog ten minutes for thirty-five cents and minds the babies at fifty cents an hour.

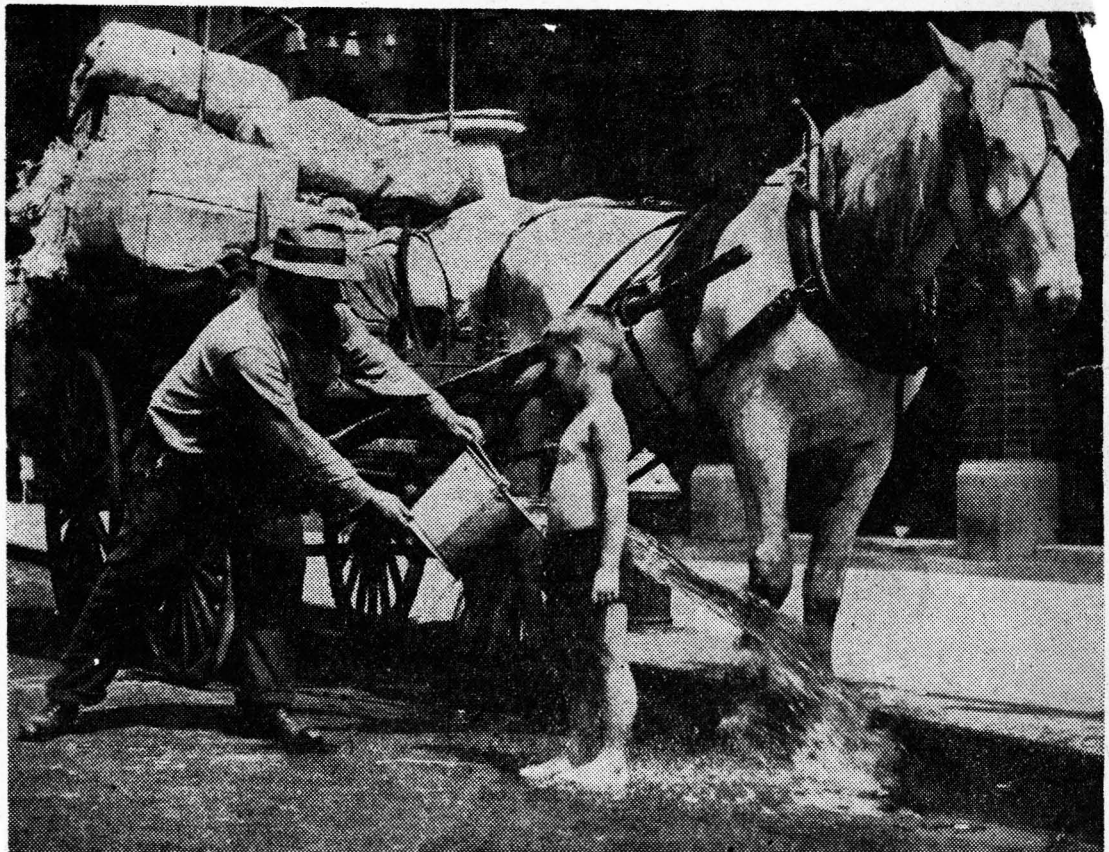
Fifty cents an hour was the highest pay she had received, she said. Annamay has a sliding wage scale that is based on what families can afford. She charges some a flat rate of \$1 for an afternoon, she says, adding that "on Park Avenue, though, I can charge the most." Baby sitting, Annamay observed, is easier than dog-walking.
